The building as it stands has all the basics that we could want; it's all on one floor with an access ramp already provided, decent toilets, a proper kitchen, store room, a small room for meeting &c. and another we're using as a vestry. On top of that we have one huge room to use for worship which we are planning to fit a folding partition so we can hire out the outer part without compromising the worship space. We are hoping and planning to provide a space where local community activities can take place.

With a screen and projector the possibilities widen greatly, there is already interest in this. If you didn't make it to our first service last Sunday come along soon and see our new home!

We are also pleased to announce that Rev. Sue Woolley will be our quarter-time minister from 1st January 2016, and she has lots of ideas for our future in our new home. Finally congratulations to all who have laboured over the last few weeks to make this all happen – 'few weeks' - it seems to have happened so swiftly.

2016: A Brave New Year for Northampton Unitarians

At the end of 2015, our Chairman Jon Small wrote in our newsletter: "This year has seen some changes and not a little excitement! A little while ago we thought our collective prayers had been answered when the Christian Science Church came on the market ... but the Central Mosque further along the road got there first, so we are still at Hazelwood Road. This experience has led to a reinvigoration of our search for a more suitable home, who knows, by this time next year we may be in a new, better building." We did not know how prescient those words were!

It is now "this time next year" and we are indeed in a new, better building. Less than three months after first viewing it, on a warm September evening, and thanks to the generosity of the Midland Unitarian Association, who gave us a short-term bridging loan, and to the hard work of all concerned, Northampton Unitarians moved into our new home, Northampton Unitarians Meeting House.

The move took place on Friday 11th December; the Saturday was spent getting organised and tidying round, and we met for worship for the first time in our new home at 10.30 am on Sunday 13th December.

As well as the two main rooms, the Manfield Room, which will be our main worship space, and the Weiss Room, which will be used for other-than-Sunday gatherings and committee meetings, we also have a sizeable kitchen, an office / Vestry for our new quarter-time minister, and a storage room. There are ladies and gents toilets, and we intend to convert the gents into a disabled toilet during 2016. The Weiss Room chairs were a kindly gift from the Black Country Group of Unitarians, based at Old Meeting House Dudley.

Rev. Sue Woolley, whom we have called to a quarter-time ministry from 1st January 2016, led our first service, on the theme of Hope. She shared a quote by Goethe, which a Unitarian friend had sent to her:

"The moment one definitely commits oneself, then Providence moves too. All sorts of things occur to help one that would never otherwise have occurred. A whole stream of events issues from the decision, raising in one's favour all manner of unforeseen incidents ... and material assistance, which no man could have dreamed would have come his way. Whatever you can do, or dream you can do, begin it. Boldness has genius, power, and magic in it. Begin it now."

Sue commented "I am still finding it hard to believe that we are here, *less than three months* since Simon, David, and I first viewed this place, and instantly knew that it was ideal for us. It has felt like a long journey, with a few twists and turns along the way, but actually the speed at which everything has fallen into place has been dizzying. There has been an amazing grace about it all." 2016 is our new beginning as a congregation. We have hopes and dreams and a vision, and are moving towards making them come true.

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Between Present and Future: a blogpost

In this deep breath between Christmas and the New Year, I would like to share some words by Patience Strong: "It is good to throw away the old calendar with its all to familiar picture, and to hang something fresh on the wall. How clean and bright the new calendar looks! It seems to symbolise the high hopes of this ... new year. But as I flick through the crisp new pages of the months, I am suddenly aware of the strange mystery of the future. These pages with their neat rows of dates represent unlived time, the promise of seasons not yet come to fulfilment."

This time of year is full of new promise.



During the last year, all of us have fallen short, and been less than the best people we can be. But we have also done some things well, and lived up to our potential as human beings. Many world religions have a special time of year, during which adherents "reflect on and evaluate their thoughts, words, and actions over the past year [and] acknowledge their prejudices, negative behaviours, and bad habits, so that they may begin the process of transforming themselves." The Hindu festival of Diwali is one, and the ten-day period leading up to the Jewish festival of Yom Kippur is another. It is a time "to celebrate and appreciate life and

to look forward to the coming year with a renewed sense of purpose and passion." For Christians, it is the period of Lent, but for the vast majority of people in Britain, who do not follow any particular faith tradition. New Year is the time for reflecting on the past, and making resolutions for the future.

The process of self-examination is not an easy one. One of my favourite theologians is the wonderful Rabbi Lionel Blue, who I have been listening to on Radio 4's *Thought for the Day* for more years than I care to remember. I have most of his books, which I have read and re-read, and was lucky enough to go and see him live at the Derngate Theatre in Northampton a few years ago. Over the years, he has taught me that the only thing that God wants from us is for us to be more kind, more generous to everyone (including ourselves) and more honest, both with ourselves, and with our fellow travellers in the world. It is about listening to that inner voice, whether we call it God, or the light within, or our conscience, and about doing the right thing, rather than the easy one.

My resolution for the coming year, as our congregation sets out on a new adventure in our lovely new building, is to follow the advice of Lyman Abbott (born 1835):

"Put all your ambition, all your enthusiasm, into the work of service. make it the aim of your life to leave the world better and happier because you have lived in it, and take without greed or grasping what the world will give you of service in return."

We have achieved an enormous amount in 2015, and I really hope that we can build on this foundation, and spread the Unitarian word through Northampton and beyond, in 2016.
