## **KOFI ANNAN AT ST. PAUL'S**

The Global Poverty Meeting held at St. Paul's Cathedral on Wednesday 6th July was truly memorable. 4500 attendees, including 2000 turned away, had been attracted by the Bob Geldof Campaign and the desire to be involved in an historic process.

Keynote speaker, Kofi Annan, UN Secretary-General, and one of the fathers of the UN Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) spoke of his great happiness "very heaven" to be part of this gathering "brought together under God, under one roof and under the banner of the white band of poverty." The period before the G8 meetings at Gleneagles was, he said, a "make or break moment for the MDGs... and for the world's poor."

He gave four reasons why the MDGs made in 2000 had become different from “the broken promises over the past fifty years.”

“For the first time, rich countries have accepted their share of responsibility to support the efforts of poor countries, through more and better aid, debt cancellation and fairer trade”. At the same time developing countries “have accepted their share through improved governance and better use of resources”. Second, “the Goals are people-centred, time-bound and measurable.” We have “clear benchmarks of progress, both globally and on a country-by-country basis”, to track progress and combat corruption and mismanagement. Third, the MDGs have unprecedented political support. They have been endorsed by all (189) Member States of the United Nations, approved by the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund. Fourth, “and most important”: “the MDGs are **achievable.**”

For the purposes of the Goals “extreme poverty” refers to individuals having less than one U.S. dollar a day in order to survive. The first Goal was to halve the estimated number of **one billion people, one in five of the developing world, who exist in extreme poverty.** Over the past 15 years, the number of people in Asia, living in this state, has been cut **by more than a quarter of a billion.** Even in Africa, some countries have sustained growth rates which make the attainment of the main Goals, when combined with better governance and better targeted expenditures on health and education, achievable by 2015. “Yet the very poorest are getting poorer: sub-Saharan Africa is falling seriously short on most of the Goals. In Asia, 700 million people still live on less than a \$1 a day. “Friends, how can anyone sit back knowing this to be the case? **There is no autopilot, no magic of the marketplace, no rising tide in the global economy that will lift all boats...**” “If current trends persist, some of the poorest countries will not be able to meet many, or perhaps any, of the Goals by 2015.”

Dr. Annan reminded his audience that two thirds of the world’s poor live in rural areas and depend on agriculture. “That means that we have to end agricultural subsidies in rich countries to give farmers in the developing world a fairer deal...we have to end trade and non-trade barriers that stifle progress towards the MDGs.” “For too long some of the world’s poorest countries have been obliged **to write off their people’s lives in order to service their debt.**”

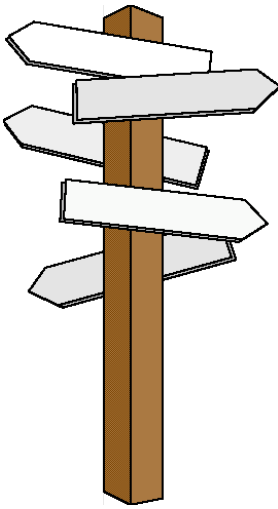
“Success will require sustained action across the entire decade between now and 2015.” “That is why the mass mobilization we are now seeing is so important.” “There are encouraging signs that the critical ingredient, political will, is emerging.”

“Ladies and gentleman, we have a once in a generation chance to bring about historic, fundamental change....Let history not say about our age, that we were those who were rich in means, but poor in will.”

Space does not permit reports of the outstanding contributions made by the Right Reverend Richard Chartres, Bishop of London; Wahu Kaara, representing African Christian NGOs; Alison Marshall, representing UK NGOs; Paul Myners, representing “the City” and the Rt. Hon. Gordon Brown, Chancellor of the Exchequer all expressing in powerful and even passionate words, the need to aim for greater Goals than the MDGs and to truly end all poverty.

May I conclude with a personal thought that if this great aim were realized, it would be the greatest achievement in the history of humankind.

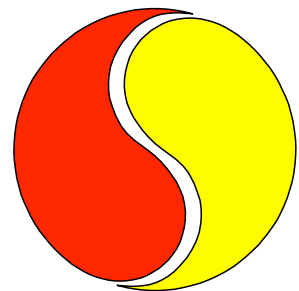
