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Statement of Belief (taken from our website)

Neighbourhood and Community

Since this edition of our newsletter lands in January - Happy New Year for 2020! (if you pick this up to read later in the quarter substitute an appropriate greeting, Happy Valentine's, Dydd Gŵyl Dewi Hapus)

I've had a really warm welcome to the community since joining you in September and I very much enjoy our longer periods of time to chatter around the service on a Sunday. There's a few more of us around and we're definitely drinking more pots of tea and making more washing up, but as someone said "it's a lovely 'problem' to have"!

From January I'm leading our regular third Sunday service, and each quarter we'll gather to explore a different theme over the three months. In time there's potential for this to influence our programming beyond Sundays.

This quarter, our theme is Neighbourhood and Community. Hopefully this will give us an opportunity to think outside the walls of the Meeting House to our friends and neighbours locally in Northampton Town Centre, and also any connections we each have to our wider community. February is also LGBT History Month with the theme of Poetry, Prose and Plays. So our 3rd Sunday will also include the voices of the LGBT community.

For a long while Tuesday evenings once a month have given an opportunity to explore an alternative spiritual practice with our Labyrinth. It's been great personally to take the time to walk this and I'd encourage anyone who's not explored this before to come and try it out (also an opportunity for more tea and chatter afterwards... more washing up, lovely problem!). Using my musical background, I'm hoping to expand our Tuesdays with a Taizé Evening once a month. If you'd be interested in this please let me know, once there's a bit of interest we'll choose which Tuesday of the month and hopefully get this going in the first half of the year!



Finally but not least... in November Rev Sue Woolley set us a challenge during her service... Could we open for a couple of hours during the week with some hospitality outside of our regular service time? ... now one of the other 'lovely problems' we have as a community is how involved in other things many of us already are! And obviously a number of us work regular hours during the week... However, after a bit of consultation and discussion, we've maybe stumbled upon opening on a Friday afternoon for a couple of hours. Another opportunity this affords is the potential to maybe hold a quiet reflective service early on a Friday evening. The inspiration for this is from our friends at Bridport Unitarians, who hold a 30 minute reflective service on a Friday evening, which draws in various folks who live and work in the surroundings of the Chapel. Regarding this I'll have a clipboard with dates and info about this available throughout January and we'll collectively put together a plan of what we'd like to happen and I'll put out appropriate publicity for what we decide... Watch This SPACE!

Unitarians have many diverse faith communities - we are religious pluralists. It is one of our strengths, that we are able to accommodate people of differing beliefs. Today most Unitarian communities in the UK aver what Andrew Hill calls "an open acceptance and co-existence of different theological positions". This is evident if you look at the various different societies affiliated to our General Assembly, from the neo-Pagan Unitarian Earth Spirit Network, and the spiritualist Unitarian Society for Psychic Studies, to the Unitarian Christian Association (to name but three). All their members are also Unitarians, and all believe in something beyond the human / natural world. Even within a small congregation such as ours, there could be Liberal Christians, religious humanists, universalists and experientialists. And some of us fall into more than one of these categories. But what matters is that we truly believe that Unitarianism is "the Religion of the Larger Affirmation", to quote Alfred Hall, and that the values we share are more important than our diverse beliefs.

Michaela von Britzke wrote, "The times require us to move beyond our emphasis on the intellect and our dependence on the pulpit-based hierarchy, to become more expressive, egalitarian, and inclusive. We need to spend more time on holistic learning. We need to deal with shadows and projections, learn to deal with conflicts, work in groups, encounter each other deeply, in pain and joy. Sunday sermons, I believe, are the celebratory sauce for the bread pudding of daily living with integrity."

In other words, we need to become a truly welcoming spiritual community, a place where our individual spiritual and religious quests can safely be undertaken, in an atmosphere of freedom and respect and acceptance. A base from which we can go out and live our faith, not just talk about it.
