Meditation on a Tree by Jon Small

Imagine you are sitting on a comfortable chair on a fine Autumn day. This chair in on a large grassed area, perhaps in a park. In front of you is a large, mature, deciduous tree, perhaps a beech or oak. It is far enough away for you to see the whole thing without having to turn your head.

You can feel a light breeze on your face and hear the leaves of the tree rustling in the wind.

There must have been rain a little while ago because you can smell damp grass and earth.

The sky is blue, however, and small fleecy clouds are passing slowly by.

You look at the tree and see that some of the leaves are already turning brown and gold.



Just one leaf detaches itself from a branch and lazily falls to the ground to become entangled in the grass.

You begin to imagine what the tree will look like in the fullness of winter with dark, stark, branches black against the sky.

Whilst you are thinking on this you are looking at the tree without actually "seeing" it so as to speak; but you begin to realise that around the tree, a few feet away from it, against the sky you can see a sort of lighter area.

Above the tree against the sky the lighter area resembles an invisible flame waving back and forth it with the wind. You are seeing the tree's aura.

You now notice that the aura extends to the ground and there is within it a sort of current flowing up from the ground and circulating down from the lower branches.

This is the process by which the tree lives, drawing water and nutrients up through its leaves from its roots and every year dropping its leaves and fertilizing the soil for another year.

It is always cooler beneath a tree, not just because of the shade, but because of the air circulating under its foliage, it acts as an airconditioner.

You are watching one of the cycles of life. We are all part of the great rhythm of life that is made up of countless of these rhythms.

So now, you wish your tree well and relax, taking comfort in this knowledge and returning gently and gradually back to the here and now.
